
Mathematics and Languages, particularly the language of learning and teaching shows positive trends.

83% of grade three learners and 64% of grade six learners have obtained marks above 50% in Mathematics.

We remain concerned that grade nine learners are still not achieving at expected levels and the performance in the language of learning and teaching though with signs of improvement, still lags behind that of Mathematics.

he Mpumalanga province achieved a 79% pass rate for the 2018 matriculation results giving it a 4.2% improvement from the previous year. Mpumalanga is one of two provinces with the highest margin of improvement in the country.

With the successful Mpumalanga matric pass rate HOD of Education Mrs Mhlabane said that, "we are convinced that the working



utomi Khoza from Tekataku outside Nelspruit in Mpumalanga achieved seven distinctions in the 2018 matric exams despite his home background. According to his father Dennis Khoza, 57, Vutomi is a disciplined and respectful child and a hard worker.

"His respect for us as his parents has surely paid off because he is such a young humble guy. He sure took me by surprise with such great results that he pulled off; although I knew that he would make it, but this is huge and it changes his and the family's whole future," Khoza said. He recalled that Vutomi would sometimes go to school without food, but never complained.

"My son accepted our situation at home and he never questioned why today he has no food or money to carry for school," he said. Vutomi's mother, 48, Community Works Programme worker Gladness Nyalungu, said her son did not have many friends, as he was always reading when not studying. "I love the man my son is because he loves knowledge, and you will see it in the way he loves reading. He was always glued to his

books and was never a child who hangs in the street," she said.

Vutomi intends to study Chemical Engineering this year and encourages children from poor backgrounds to learn mathematics and

physical science as a clear way out of poverty.

"My wish is to come back home and endorse programmes that have to teach children in primary schools more about the science

subjects," he said.

s Team Education, we shall continue to rally side with our stakeholders an above 80% overall performance in Grades 3, 6, 9 and 12 in all our schools becomes a reality.

The time has come for the Department to reward performing schools with the support they require to sustain good performance. For years, we have channelled more resources to underperforming schools. The Department will offer amongst others special support to:

- Secondary schools that performed at 70% and above;
- Schools that offer Grade 12 for the first time:
- the OR Tambo Mathematics, Science and

Technology Academy Schools;

- Public Funded Boarding School
- Primary Schools that have less than 70% of their learners performing below 50% in Mathematics and in the Language of Learning and Teaching in exit grades

We will continue supporting talented learners in all subjects, render radio lessons for grade 12 highenrolment subjects to also support learners participating in Multiple Examination Opportunities (MEOs). Our support to teachers and subject advisors will be heightened as we plan to deliver these for extended periods including during school holidays.

Indeed, it is our shared view that these efforts will assist a great deal in ushering a new performance order for all our schools

and we thus urge all learners and educators to take advantage of these support initiatives.

SECOND CHANCES

"It remains essential that we continue to grant support to the 9387 candidates that did not make the grade. As a Department, we cannot leave these learners to their own demise as we have programmes that are meant to assist them at times like these. It is in that spirit that I wish to request parents and community members not to put undue pressure on these learners but to afford them care and support so that they can successfully take advantage of the opportunities available to them to reach their

full potential."
