





Welcome back to the final edition of the 2011/ 2012 financial year.

As a caring Department, Social Development has in the past 12 months strengthened its relations with its agencies; SASSA, NDA, private sector companies and other Government Departments to bring about the envisaged society.

Together with the agencies and other Government Departments, the Department managed to change people's lives for the better. These include child headed households, older persons and persons with disabilities amongst others.

Services to children received a huge boost when a campaign on Early Childhood Development was launched. The campaign encourages all organizations working with children to register with the Department. It is through these services that the lives of many orphaned and vulnerable children are well looked after and well groomed.

36 Youth Development Centres were funded to provide youth development services which include career guidance, job preparedness, entrepreneurship development, life skills, business counseling. All these services are continuing and are targeting the youth.

The Department hosted a successful summit on Not-For-Profit Organisations (NPO) with NPOs and other stakeholders in the social sector to strengthen relationship with the stakeholders. Communication with the NPO has as a result of this summit been strengthened.

The Mpumalanga Provincial Drug Master Plan was launched in June 2011, where key role players were in attendance. These include SAPS, SANCA and community members. Resolutions taken at the summit include amongst others; establishment of Local Drug Action Committees and District Drug Action Committees to deal with issues of Substance Abuse at a local level.

In the next 3 months, the Department will have the 2012/2013 Policy and Budget Speech tabled and celebrate the International Family Day in May, Child Protection Week from May to June, International Children's Day in June and the International Day against Drug Abuse and illicit Trafficking. As a member of the Community you are once again called upon to take part in these celebrations and making inputs on how best can social development services be delivered in your area.

As a Department of Social Development, we are proud of the strides in making the lives of people in the Province better. 

Public Private Partnership In action

he Calcutta Victim Empowerment (VEP) Centre in Mkhuhlu with a local Social Worker has a identified a family of ten which lives in a one roomed mud house.

The Sambo family was identified during the school visit campaign done by the Calcutta VEP and the Department of Social Development when they found a destitute child and decided to visit her family, upon arrival they discovered housing, economic and social problems.

The family used to survive by hand outs from community members of **Cork Village in** Bushbuckridge.

Social workers are currently working together with Home Affairs to help provide the family get **Identity Documents.**

Constable Mtungwa who is a member of the VEP and Sambo housing project coordinator said they requested Build It Hardware from Mkhuhlu to assist in donated building materials; Obed Constructions donated bricks; VEP members donated food from their own pockets; Correctional Services brought in labourers through community service of ex-convicts and Community Workers Programme members who assisted with labour.



The aim of the four roomed house for the Sambo family is to protect the children from sexual abuse and restoring the family's dignity.


Focus areas were HIV and AIDS, Early Childhood Development (ECD) and Youth.

The prime aim of this educational awareness campaign was to highlight the plight of older persons and educate them about their rights as enshrined in the Constitution of South Africa.

With a variety of roles to play in the households,

"this campaign educates older persons about their rights" thus ensuring a

thus ensuring a dignified treatment by members of family and society at large.

In addition to these roles,

"older persons also have a responsibility of raising and nurturing their grandchildren"

.....including those who are orphaned as a result of social ills such as HIV and AIDS.

The Deputy Minister handed over blankets and food parcels to the grannies.

"We are thankful and grateful to the Department for reminding us of our rights as older persons. I also wish that our children were part of this gathering so that they can hear and understand what our rights are, as older persons" said Gogo Nomvula Zulu.













The National Department of Social Development, in collaboration with USAID, has initiated the Thogomelo Psychosocial Support Skills Development Programme which offers South Africa's first accredited training in psychosocial support and child protection for community caregivers. It is aimed at improving the quality of care and protection of children made vulnerable by HIV and AIDS, poverty, abuse, neglect and exploitation.

"Thogomelo" is a Tshivenda word meaning "to care for". >

he HIV epidemic has impacted severely on South Africa's children many of whom have become orphans. In response to this and other challenges, thousands of ordinary people have stepped up to volunteer in their communities. Community caregivers support children's access to food, social benefits, education, health services and psychosocial support. However, these individuals have limited support for themselves, and no career paths.


Operating on the premise that a supported caregiver is a more effective caregiver and working in collaboration with the Health and Welfare Sector Education and Training Authority (HWSETA), South Africa's skills development regulatory body, the project aims to facilitate entry level jobs and a career path for this hitherto unrecognized component of the social welfare workforce.



hree Skills Development Programmes in psychosocial wellbeing, child protection and supportive supervision are delivered by training service providers in all provinces. The graduation ceremony therefore recognises the first group of 101 learners whose results have been successfully endorsed by the HWSETA.
