PREMIER NDLOVU LEADS PHILANTROPIC WORK



everal Home Based Care Centres Bushbuckridge Local Municipality have been revamped. These centres, namely, the Oakley Home Care, the Kgotsofatso Based Stimulation Centre both in Casteel, the Mathomomayo Drop in Centre in Buffelshoek, the Goromane Home Based Care and the Ntalo Old Age Centre in Gottenberg, provide shelter to several children with disabilities and orphans as well as the elderly. Most of them were in dilapidated conditions and depended heavily on support from Non-Governmental Organisations (NGO's) to provide the less privileged with social and humanitarian needs.

Through the intervention of the Premier, Mr Mandla Ndlovu, the centres are now the pride of the local communities. Not only have their interior and exterior conditions improved, but have been upgraded, in line with the Premier's vision to improve the socio-economic conditions of communities in Mpumalanga.

The centres are now cultivating vegetable gardens to produce organic food, and water is supplied through the installation of Jojo tanks, to address water challenges. Several new wheelchairs have also been donated to assist with mobility to some beneficiaries.

On Mandela Day, Mr Ndlovu led an entourage of MECs, Executive Mayors, Traditional and community leaders to deliver a consignment of donated material that are a requisite for the effective functionality of the centres. The Premier's donation of new school uniforms and shoes at the Oakley Home Based Care Centre is testament to his passion for education.

In a Province where poverty is at 49.5 percent, the interventions at the centres was a clarion call to the theme: "It is still in our hands to combat poverty and inequality" of this year's Mandela Day, as the country marks 13 years since Mandela's passing. The day long activities conculded with a community and stakeholder engagement where government services and exhibitions were on site at Thulamahashe Stadium within the locality.

Going big on donations

resh from being pronounced as the Department of Cooperative Governance, Human Settlements and Traditional Affairs (CoGHSTA), MEC Speed Mashilo led a joint programme at various villages, Dr. Moroka Local Municipality. Zamani Disability Centre Ka-Hhoyi in Nkomazi Local Municipality welcomed unexpected guests to their backyard. MEC for Community Safety, Security and Liaison, Mr. Jackie Macie and Local Executive Mayor, Cllr Phindile Magagula traded their formal to work wear as they took part in the maintenance of the facility. It operates as a stimulation centre and caters for over 110 persons with disabilities. On a regular basis, it provides meals and necessary services to people with disabilities. The facility also plays a vital role of accommodating community members during disasters which often trouble the locality.

With the assistance of good samaritans, MEC Macie donated a stove, fridge, kitchen unit and other amenities to the 1994 established centre. He advocated for the spirit of selflessness and values that Madiba espoused and stood for.

Both the municipality and the beneficiaries welcomed the donations and it is believed that the gesture will go a long way in aiding them and the local community. The safety and protection of the vunerable, especially with the scourge of GBVF pandemic in society is paramount.

lobal warming remains one of the enormous environmental challenges facing the world. Consequently, there is an urgent need to develop and improve sound plans to care for the current in order to preserve the future. This simply refers to sustainable development, which is an approach to growth, and human development that aims to meet the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their needs. The phenomenon aims to balance the needs of the economy, environment, and social well-being.

In bringing communities on board, the Department of Agriculture, Rural Development, Land and Environmental Affairs (DARDLEA) collaborated with Fibre Circle on a drive to empower school learners and communities to venture into Circular Economy. With other stakeholders, they jointly hosted the Mandela Campaign at Nelsville, City of Mbombela. The thrust of the day was on environmental sustainability through innovation in waste management.

They are also involved in the improvement of food security through planting of trees and vegetable gardens at schools and households. Based on the theme - "Turning Waste into Art" - five selected schools displayed their creativity and innovation - much to the joy of the organisers.

All the schools – Benjamin, Matsulu Primary Schools, Cyril Clarke Secondary, Sitfokotile and Sibusisiwe High Schools from Mbombela were awarded with two recycling bins and bulk bags each, while four SMME Buy Back Centers were given Recyclers Packs and Recycling Trolleys.

ovember 2009 - in recognition of the former South African President's contribution to the culture of peace and freedom, the United Nations (UN) General Assembly declares 18 July "Nelson Mandela International Day".

According to the UN, resolution A/RES/64/13 recognizes Mandela's values and his dedication to the service of humanity in: conflict resolution; race relations; promotion and protection of human rights; reconciliation; gender equality and the rights of children and other vulnerable groups; the fight against poverty; the promotion of social justice. The resolution acknowledges his contribution to the struggle for democracy internationally and the promotion of a culture of peace throughout the world.

The day honours the legacy of one of the world's most revered leaders by encouraging people to take action and make a difference in their communities. Volunteering on this day is more than just a gesture of goodwill. It is an opportunity to contribute to the

global movement for positive change. There are countless reasons to get involved, but here are nine reasons why compelling becoming Nelson а Mandela Day volunteer can be one of the most impactful decisions you make. Whether you are motivated by a desire to help others, a commitment to justice, or the pursuit of personal growth, these reasons will inspire you to take up the call to service and continue Mandela's legacy of

compassion, equality, and resilience.

We will never, ever give up making this **W** world better for everyone, everywhere.



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
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
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
