In January 2026, the Department of Basic Education announced that South Africa's matric class of 2025 achieved an impressive national pass rate of 88%, a milestone that reflects the highest performance in our democratic history. Mpumalanga Province stood tall as a pillar of this success, securing an magnificent overall pass rate of 86.55%. This represents a meaningful leap from the previous year's 84.99%, with every single district - Ehlanzeni, Gert Sibande, Nkangala, and Bohlabela - soaring past the 80% mark target. MPUMALANGA SCOOPS 86,5 PERCENT PASS RATE AMID PERSISTENT CHALLENGES

Despite ongoing national and provincial challenges within the basic education sector, Mpumalanga continues to demonstrate resilience, progress, and a firm commitment to improving learning outcomes.

According to the Department of Basic Education a significant number of public schools across South Africa still lack access to essential infrastructure such as libraries, laboratories and adequate sanitation facilities. These constraints continue to hinder the delivery of quality education. Mpumalanga has not been immune to these challenges. Persistent overcrowding, limited learner admission spaces in fast-growing towns, a high unemployment rate among qualified educators, and pressure on existing school infrastructure remain areas of concern.

Against this backdrop, the 2025 National Senior Certificate (NSC) results reflect a year of determination and collective effort. Learners, educators, school leadership, families, and communities worked together to overcome obstacles and seize opportunities within an evolving educational landscape.

The Mpumalanga Department of Education achieved a major milestone by recording an overall matric pass rate of 86.55 percent in 2025. This represents a sustained upward trajectory from 77.0 percent in 2023 and 85.0 percent in 2024, highlighting growing

system stability and improved learner support mechanisms.

During the announcement of the results in Secunda, the Premier, Mr Mandla Ndlovu congratulated the Class of 2025 while MEC Masina of Education praised learners, educators, parents, and school leaders for their resilience, dedication, and commitment to excellence.

For the first time in the province's history, all districts achieved pass rates above the 80 percent benchmark, signalling a systemic improvement in education delivery across Mpumalanga.

Luyanda Ndlozi from Elangwane Secondary School emerged as the province's top achiever and a Top 40 national performer, receiving a brand-new car in recognition of her outstanding academic achievement.

Siyanda Welcome Nkuna from Inkomazi Secondary School achieved a perfect score of 100 percent (300/300) in Mathematics, earning the title of Top Mathematics Achiever nationally.

Premier Mandla Ndlovu highlighted that Mpumalanga has achieved a 97.1 percent learner retention rate, ranking the province third nationally.

"We must track the 32.2 percent of missing youth who are not in education or have dropped

out, as this ultimately contributes to the youth graduate unemployment rate of 14.2 percent recorded in the third quarter of 2025. The Mpumalanga Provincial Government remains committed to supporting the education sector," said the Premier.

He further announced key interventions aimed at strengthening digital learning and access:


- Tablets distributed to all 2026 matric learners
- Grade 10 learners to receive tablets in 2026, marking a major milestone in digital education
- Ongoing modernisation of school infrastructure, including free Wi-Fi access to support digital learning tools

MEC for Education Ms Lindi Masina expressed gratitude to educators for their dedication and patriotic service.

All districts exceeded the national benchmark of 80%:

1. Ehlanzeni: 88.0% (Top-performing district)
2. Nkangala: 87.4% (Improved by 2.1%)
3. Gert Sibande: 87.1%
4. Bohlabela: 83.5% (Most improved, +4.9%)


Mpumalanga V/S National (NSC From 2014 – 2025)

PRIVATE SECTOR URGED TO DEVELOP COMMUNITIES

Infrastructure development remains key in tackling service delivery challenges in the country, especially in rural areas. The mining sector, which plies its trade in farming areas, has urged to contribute towards infrastructure development. In each of the country's provinces, the top four largest industries include a mix of finance, personal services, mining, manufacturing and trade. In 2024, mining was the main driver of economic activity in Mpumalanga, North West and Northern Cape, and the second largest in Limpopo.



During the 2026 school's re-opening programme, to assess the state of learning and teaching by the Executive Council and councillors, Mpumalanga MEC for Cooperative Governance, Human Settlements, and Traditional Affairs, Mr. Speed Mashilo visited Lehlaka Combined School in Rietspruit, eMalahleni Local Municipality. This farming school has been on a steady rise in producing great results across the board, including Grade 12.

It is very important that people benefit from companies or mines operating in their communities. "I should be convening a meeting with the Department of Public Works, Roads and Transport, the municipality and the mines, including Glenco, Seriti and other stakeholders to explore ways to tackle issues of infrastructure, especially roads, electricity and water and on a bigger scale, social responsibility initiatives by the mines", charged Mashilo.

Just like most mining towns, the community of Rietspruit suffered a serious set-back when the mine shut down few years ago, leaving scores stranded and without jobs. Though in a municipal jurisdiction, the area was managed by the mine. Established in 1979, the 550 pupils, 19 educators, and 69 matriculants school, it owes its existence to the private sector. It was recently renovated and is in a good condition, thus enabling teaching and learning, to take place unhindered. Over the years, the school has seen a steady improvement on matric results from a meagre 35%, 25%, 69%, 55%, 72.9% and 91% from 2020 to 2025.

Thriving on discipline and commitment, the school is becoming a beacon of hope for the once flourishing community. School Principal, Mr. Vusi Zikhala appreciated the support they are getting from the private sector. The school was fully renovated by Seriti Mining last year. "I still plead with the private sector to give

more support when it comes to infrastructure development of our school. We still need a science and computer laboratories", he pleaded. According Zikhala, they have set themselves a 100% target for matric results for the class of 2026. Support from parents, government and the private sector remains critical to this aspiration.

Mining activities are responsible for the bulk of the country's manufacturing value added. Meanwhile, Glencore Mine donated school shoes to 200 learners and tablets, benefiting a sizable number of pupils and the school. "On a yearly basis as a mining company, we assist all the schools around here as part of our social responsibility", indicated quipped Glencoe's Community Development Superintendent, Mr Sibusiso Mbebe. The 2025 results include 23 Bachelors, 21 distinctions, and a massive 100% pass rate in six subjects. Lehlaka Combined School is a classical example that, if you put your mind to it, you are bound to succeed.

BUILDING EXCELLENCE, TOGETHER

Steve Tshwete Local Municipality Executive Mayor, Cllr Mhlonishwa Masilela proudly celebrated the success of the Class of 2025 recently during a special awards ceremony. The top 10 learners from across the Municipal jurisdiction were honoured for their outstanding academic performance and were presented with trophies, certificates, and gift vouchers.

Executive Mayor Masilela congratulated the learners for their hard work and excellent results, and encouraged school principals to continue striving for excellence to ensure that the Class of 2026 works harder

and performs well. He further expressed his hope that the Municipality will produce the best learner in the province, who stands a chance to receive a car at the Provincial Awards.

The celebration also marked a proud milestone for the Municipality, which continues to be among the top-performing municipalities in the province, and acknowledged the 100% pass rate achieved by, Bankfontein Secondary School, Middelburg Muslim School and Middelburg Hoërskool.

Learn from those who came before you, believe in your abilities, and remember that excellence is a daily choice. The

future is watching, and we have no doubt that you can take Mashishing Secondary School to even greater heights," said the Executive Mayor.

As part of 2026 back to school campaign, the Executive Mayor, of Bushbuckridge Municipality Cllr Lydia Moroane, visited Godide High School at Rolle. During the visit, the Executive Mayor welcomed the learners, Educators and the support staff

of the school on their first day in 2026, she encouraged the learners to take their studies seriously from day 1, listen and respect their educators and parents/guardians.

The Executive Mayor did not go to the school empty handed, as she also handed over 100 full kit uniform.

DELIVERING A CREDIBLE NSC EXAMINATION

The Mpumalanga Province remained confident and ready to administer an incident-free 2025 National Senior Certificate Examination which commenced in full scale on 23 October and proceeded until 27 November 2025. This was to ensure a credible, transparent, and fair examination process that upholds the integrity of the National Senior Certificate," said the MEC for Education, Ms. Lindi Masina.

Candidate registration was successfully completed through the SA-SAMS system, with all data uploaded to the Examination System by 30 June 2025. A total of 69 980 candidates have registered to write the 2025 NSC examinations in the province. This number constitutes an increase of 2 749 candidates compared to the previous year, 2024.

Ehlanzeni District recorded the highest number of learners at 18 764, followed by Nkangala District with 17 490, Gert Sibande District with 17 061, and Bohlabela District with 16 665 learners. Examinations were conducted across 583 centres, all of which have been successfully audited.

The Department provided the necessary support for candidate registration and data verification, with 39 centres being accredited as independent schools. A comprehensive Risk Management Plan was developed to mitigate potential disruptions, including community protests, load-shedding, floods, and other natural disasters. The printing and packaging processes for examination papers were significantly strengthened.

It is encouraging that for the past 14 years, the Mpumalanga Education Department has successfully managed incident-free examinations with no question paper leakages, a record we are determined to uphold. Indeed, security, integrity and credibility of

the examination remains a top priority for the Department. All storage points are centrally monitored to ensure strict compliance with security protocols in close collaboration with the South African Police Service (SAPS).

The Department sought a buy in from communities by making a clarion call to all school communities, associations of school governing bodies, education sector unions and non-governmental organizations to rally side by side with the Department and to be the first line of defence. These stakeholders were called upon to be vigilant and play an active role in safeguarding the examinations.

All grade 12 learners across the province participated in signing the Pledge of Good Conduct on 17 October 2025. The pledge signing was intended to appeal to learners' conscience and reinforce ethical conduct throughout the examination period. The Department thus urged all learners to adhere strictly to the examination rules and regulations as any form of irregularity or misconduct, as such actions compromise the credibility of the entire examination process and would not be tolerated.

Chief Invigilators and Invigilators were trained during September 2025 and both the Department of Basic Education and Umalusi have conducted audits confirming compliance with the appointment processes for markers.

The marking commenced on 02 November until 12 December 2025 in 21 marking centres across the province. All centres completed self-evaluation audit instruments, and new centres underwent physical inspections to ensure full compliance. The Department ensured that all learners achieve exceptional results. However, should that not be the case, a provincial pass rate that exceeds 90% will still be appreciated.

This pass target was informed by the support rendered to the Class of 2025 in the past 12 years of their studies within this Province including

the work done by our teachers. "We take this opportunity to appeal to all communities, parents, faith-based organisations, and social partners to continue supporting the Class of 2025 as they take this final and defining step in their schooling journey.

The Department, in partnership with the Moral Regeneration Movement, hosted a Provincial Prayer Session on Thursday, 16 October 2025, at Graceland Hotel, Secunda, to seek divine guidance and blessings for our learners during this examination period. We call upon all religious leaders to continue praying for success, calmness, and for our learners.

To the Class of 2025 – this is your moment to shine. You have worked tirelessly, overcome challenges, and shown resilience throughout the year. As you approach these final examinations, remember that success is built on preparation, discipline, and belief in your own abilities.

Stay calm, focused, and confident. Read each question carefully, manage your time wisely, and always give your best effort in every paper you write. You are not just writing for yourself, you carry the hopes of your families, your schools, and your communities. We believe in you. We are proud of you. And we are confident that you will rise to the occasion and make Mpumalanga and South Africa proud.

On behalf of the Mpumalanga Provincial Government, we wish every learner the very best in the 2025 National Senior Certificate Examinations. May your hard work bear the fruits of excellence, and may your results open doors to endless opportunities and a brighter future. The 2025 National Senior Certificate Examination Results were officially announced on 13 January 2026," concluded MEC Masina.

As part of the back-to-school campaign the MEC for Health, Ms Sasekani Manzini visited Marcia Mokoena Secondary School in Marite, Bushbuckridge, to provide support and monitor the school's state of readiness as the academic year begins. Marcia Mokoena Secondary School, which has over 800 learners, continues to show encouraging signs of improved academic

performance. The school's matric pass rate increased from 65.1% in 2024 to 73.5% in 2025, reflecting the commitment of both learners and educators.

The Department's School Health Team conducted health screenings for all learners to identify any health-related challenges that could hinder learning. Furthermore, we reaffirmed our commitment to supporting

learners throughout the year to help them achieve top academic results. Addressing the learners MEC Manzini said "as government, we firmly share the belief that children are our future, and it is our responsibility to ensure that no obstacle stands in the way of their academic success" Manzini concluded her visit by donating school shoes, school backpacks, and sanitary towels to learners in need.

Social Development MEC, Ms Nompumelelo Hlophe visited HTS Middelburg Secondary on January 14, 2025, as part of the Provincial Government's back- to- school campaign, to assess its readiness for the academic year. The MEC discovered that the school is ready, with textbooks, books, and other materials having been delivered

the previous year. Learners are ready and motivated to do well.

When delivering her speech, MEC Hlophe first congratulated the class of 2025 at HTS Middelburg Secondary School and further emphasized the importance of proper communication between the School Governing body (SGB) and the Department

The MEC for Economic Development and Tourism, Ms. Jesta Sidell says the Department and its Public Entities will continue unashamedly to support the efforts of the Department of Education by lending a hand to students who are coming from indigent backgrounds. Sidell echoed these profound words during the 2026 Provincial Government School Reopening Programme, at Tikhontele Secondary School, situated in Matsulu, in the City of Mbombela Local Municipality.

The School Re-opening Programme is an annual programme, whereby public representatives and government officials are deployed to primary and secondary schools across the Province to encourage both learners and teachers to work hard as the academic year begins in order to produce good results at the end of the school year. The programme also seeks to assess and evaluate school readiness ahead of the new academic year.

Of importance, this Programme affords the schools with an opportunity to raise the challenges they are faced with, which may lead to poor performance. impressive result. The school was also encouraged to maintain that positive momentum and to continue pursuing academic excellence in the 2026 academic year. These engagements are an essential component of the 2026 Back-to-School Programme, which seeks to establish a strong foundation for a successful and productive academic year ahead.

SUPPORT FROM THE VERY FIRST STEP



The Minister in the Presidency for Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities, Ms Sindisiwe Chikunga, emphasised the importance of education as a foundation for the future of the country.

The Minister, flanked by the Chief Albert Luthuli municipal leadership, visited two schools within the municipality, namely Hambanatsi Primary School in Ward 12 and Hlabangemehlo High School in Ward 16, to assess the state of readiness at the schools and to motivate learners to remain disciplined and committed to their studies.

The MEC for DARDLEA Ms Khethiwe Moeketsi visited Maqhawuzela Combined School in Tjakastad in the Chief Albert Luthuli Municipality kick-starting the 2026 academic year, encouraging the leadership at the school, the educators and learners to commit

their work for better results. Maqhawuzela achieved 87, 9% matric pass rate for the class 2025, a slight drop compared to their 2024 results.

The MEC's visit, which was part of the School Reopening Programme, saw key stakeholders joining hands, including

the Mjinti Traditional Council, discussing issues that will see a general improvement at the school henceforth.

GUIDING THE CLASS OF 2026

Dipaleseng Local Municipality leadership rolled out its annual Back to School Campaign to assess institutional readiness for the 2026 academic year within its jurisdiction.

The launch highlighted the Department's commitment to improving educational outcomes and expanding opportunities for learners who wish to complete their matric qualification.

The launch was attended by officials from the Mpumalanga Department of Education, representatives from the Gert Sibande District Municipality, Circuit Managers from both the East and West Circuits, Members of the Mayoral Committee (MMCs) from Mkhondo Local Municipality, and various school principals.




