CABINET LEADS THE CHARGE AGAINST GENDER BASED VIOLENCE



NOT IN MY NAME: Premier Refilwe Mtsweni-Tsipane together with members of her Cabinet, MECs Gillion Mashego, Sasekani Manzini, Vusi Shongwe and Norah Mahlangu joined by the community of Moloto.

"Freedom cannot be achieved unless women have been emancipated from all forms of oppression." These words echoed by Dr. Nelson Mandela remain symbolic of the struggle he fought for which was to liberate all South Africans regardless of race, gender or class. Over the past few months, South Africa has been making headlines of gruesome murder of women such as Uyinene Mrwetyana for no apparent reason.

Premier Refilwe Mtsweni-Tsipane together with her Cabinet joined the community of Moloto on the 26th of September 2019 to denounce the prevailing gender based violence. The Walk Against Gender Based Violence was joined by various community formations including religious denominations. Men took advantage of the opportunity to demonstrate their support and pledged allegiance to the constitutional imperatives of justice and freedom for all. MEC Vusi Shongwe delivered a keynote address on behalf of Premier Mtsweni-Tsipane where he encouraged women to speak out against abuse. On the same breath, he urged men to love, respect and protect women.

In one of his community engagements, MEC Gillion Mashego urged men to stand up against the scourge of violence lest they are counted amongst the perpetrators. "One cannot deny the severity of the devastation that gender based violence has inflicted against our sovereignty and in the process undermined the principles of our Freedom Charter. Our Government has taken a conscious position that women must enjoy equal rights and opportunities as enshrined in the Constitution of the Republic. The recent spate of violent attacks on women are a threat to our liberation and any threat to our liberation amounts to treason. To condemn is not enough but men must take a stand and act against such tendencies otherwise their silence gives permission to perpetrators," elaborated MEC Mashego.

he Department of Public Works, Roads and Transport presented a budget of R5.4 billion during the tabling of the budget votes at the Legislature in July 2019. The budget has seen a marginal increase of about 2.9% year on year, a far cry given the quantum

of work faced by the Department. Department has the Province. We are indeed mindful that our installment towards the eradication of poverty, unemployment inequality is insufficient to cover the interests and plight of our people, and adequately address the historical injustice accumulated over the past hundred years. However, we determined that the rising sun will not set before we have settled our account in full," elaborated MEC Mashego during the presentation.

The MEC stressed a need for stronger partnerships and collaboration between all stakeholders to push back the frontiers of poverty, which he described as the shackle of our modern age.

The budget was tabled amidst gloomy economic position which calls for doing more with less.

The MEC highlighted challenges such as increasing staff turnover in the infrastructure environment and that this remained impediments to effective service delivery. Government has used Infrastructure as an economic catalyst in the face of low global economic growth. To mitigate this challenge, the department has proactively partnered with the Council for Built Environment (CBE) to provide a structured mentorship/candidacy programme aimed at accelerating the professional registration of technical staff. This collaborative effort has already begun to bear fruit as two employees within the building infrastructure have obtained their professional registration. Another key intervention which is also bearing progress is the Young Professionals Programme which is aimed at inspiring a new generation of young people to become registered professionals.

discrimination Transport infrastructure got a lion's share of R2,5 billion, Transport operations R1.3 billion, Public Works Infrastructure got R1,2 billion with administration and community based programme netting R260 million and R86 million respectively.

> "Looking ahead to 2019/20, my Department has a significant role to play in realizing the ambition to 'Grow Mpumalanga Together', as we implement our plans, we look forward to continuing our interaction with the people of Mpumalanga, client departments and the private sector to help us craft tactics and activities that will best achieve our socio-economic objectives," concluded MEC Mashego.

Ehlanzeni District Transport Inspectorate officials joined forces with management to change the lives of a deprived family. On 26 July 2019, the officers visited Mashego family in Sand River kaMajika in the City of Mbombela. This initiative was outside the Department's mandate but a humble intervention in light of Madiba's legacy. The family was identified with an intention of rendering a helping hand in the lives of people living in poor conditions and through the assistance of the Department of Social Development (DSD).

This family of seven (7) members who live in a two room house received food, school uniform, clothes, blankets and money as part of Mandela month treat. When interviewed, the elder of the family, Ms Emily Mashego revealed that the family survive through social grant of the grandchildren and through the assistance of the aunt who

works as a domestic worker. Ms Mashego lives with her three children and three grandchildren. The family is amongst of the many citizens who are confined to poverty and living in appalling conditions. "My children are unemployed and I don't receive any social grant since I don't have an Identity Document", said 63 years old Mashego.

Mr Siyakhula Khoza, Programme Manager, stated that the donation will definitely go a long way in ensuring that the family have food on the table just like other families. "This initiative started in 2016 and it had since yielded very positive results," said Mr Khoza.

The food came as a welcome relief and the children were overjoyed. "We are looking forward for the better tomorrow," said Ms Mashego elder daughter, with excitement written over her face as she welcomed the gifts. The family thanked the Department for the good gesture shown to them.

Madiba's legacy paddles to Shobiyane

n the 22nd of July 2019 MEC GP Mashego donated 100 Shova kalula Bicycles to Shobiyana Secondary School in Acornhoek Circuit under Bohlabela District. The event was graced by Mnisi Traditional Authority and the School Governing Body.

The Shova Kalula programme was introduced as part of the Mpumalanga Rural Transport Strategy. The strategy is meant to improve mobility and accessibility in rural areas. The Shova Kalula programme benefits learners who stay more than 3 kilometres from the nearest schools but do not qualify for the Scholar Transport.

The initiative also addresses learners in poor rural areas who cannot afford transport to school by providing bicycles as a mode of transport. Transport services in rural areas is unreliable, costly and poorly coordinated, therefore the Shova Kalula project enables learners not to miss school days.

he spirit of Madiba reached people with disability on the 19th of July 2019 when MEC Gillion Mashego spent 67 minutes of his time renovating Ekujabuleni center for the disabled. The dilapidated structure of the building received a face-lift after an intervention by Ehlanzeni district as part of their Mandela Month Celebration. Officials got their hands dirty by doing plumbing, painting the entire structure, replacing locks and installing ceiling.

According to the Manager of the Center, Ms Hilda Sibande, the center was established in 1995 which accommodates at least 45 people with disabilities.

"During the day they perform various duties such beadworks, gardening and sewing traditional attires and curtains," she said. She added that they receive funding from Department of Social Development. MEC Mashego assured people living disabilities that the department will not exclude them from job opportunities especially Siyatentela programme.

Later during the day, the entourage proceeded to the road next to the school for the patching of potholes. The road maintenance team from the department joined forced with the roads team from the City of Mbombela to patch potholes.

ixty-three years ago in 1956, women redefined the narrative of the oppressive system adopted by the apartheid regime to silence the voices of the people. The unprecedented occasion championed by gallant stalwarts like Lilian Ngoyi, Helen Joseph, Rahima Moosa and Sophia Williams De Bruyn in the company of more than twenty thousand phenomenal women who marched to the Union Buildings, still resonates with the democratic Government's Programme of Action.

ACCESS TO INFORMATION: Thubelible community gets a new library.

Thubelihle community are going to benefit from the newly constructed library built by the Department of Public Works, Roads and Transport on behalf of the Department of Culture, Sports and Recreation. The R 15.5 million project commenced in November 2017 and is scheduled to be completed in February 2020, for the use by communities as well as schools across Kriel in Emalahleni Local Municipality.

The scope of work includes the construction of guardhouse and main building inclusive of offices, kitchen, store room, conference room, toilets inclusive of persons living with disability, shelving space, cyber space, group discussion area, quite area, reading area, paved parking and steel palisade fence.

undreds of citizens around The project was able to provide employment, skills development training, and economic empowerment opportunities to local contractors and community members. Out of 80 jobs opportunities were created that inclusive of women, youth and people living with disability, 108 were trained and empowered to form part to the success execution of the project.

It will assist lower grades learners, so they will get used to reading from an early age. For a matric learner, the library will mean more than just a building. he construction of Welverdiend Primary School is progressing well at Manyeleti in Bushbuckridge Local Municipality. The old structure which was built by the community ages ago has since been demolished to make way for a state-of-the-art facility.

The construction of the new school is valued at over R45 million and the project is scheduled for a duration of 12 months. The project includes 12 Classrooms, Kitchen, Guard house, Fence, Water, Electricity, Parking and Carport amongst others. The project created 43 work opportunities for the local while various businesses also benefited.

Social Enterprise Development Gains Traction

its guest to combat the Most of the challenges experienced triple challenges of poverty, unemployment and inequality, the Department conceptualised the Social Enterprise Development Programme (SEDP) as one of several strategies to transform the socio-economic landscape of the Mpumalanga Province.

Since its implementation in 2017, more than 139 SMMEs and in the SEDP database and about R331 million worth of materials have been procured from these local suppliers. Although the amount is still below anticipated projections, it is nevertheless a significant investment to bring about inclusive growth.

In this regard, the Department has partnered with Department of Economic Development and Tourism and the South African Bureau of Standards (SABS) to develop a support programme for prospective SMMEs to ensure that testing, certification and training requirements are met.

ACCESS TO HEALTHCARE SERVICES RESTORES HOPE TO SCHULZENDAL COMMUNITY

he long wait is finally over for the rural community of Schulzendal in the Nkomazi Local Municipality in Ehlanzeni District. The Department pride itself for having completed the Schulzendal Clinic on schedule on behalf of the Department of Health. Previously, residents of the community had to travel long distances to access healthcare services since there was no clinic in the area.

In the rural areas, provision of healthcare services poses a challenge because of the widely distributed villages. The project has managed to put a smile on the health workers and the community at large.

The construction of this multi-million rand project started in June 2018 and was completed

in August 2019. The project which was implemented into two (02) phases was built at a cost of approximately than R6.5 million, includes amongst others, the construction of IBT (Innovative Building Technology) structure, new perimeter fence, medical waste area, carports, guardhouse, septic tank, electricity and water. During the construction, the project provided employment, developmental training, skills, and economic empowerment to local community members and contractors. A total number of twenty (20) job opportunities were created.

Ms Annah Maseko, one of the patients, expressed her excitement over the newly constructed clinic, "We thank the Department for the new facility and we are so privileged to witness the great work done."

MILLIONS INJECTED TO BOOST MIDDELPLAAS CLINIC

he construction of the Middelplaas Clinic has finally been completed. The much anticipated project will improve the quality of healthcare and will also put a smile in the faces of patients and the clinic management. The new clinic will address the healthcare challenges that were experienced due to the dire condition of the main clinic.

This clinic is one of the oldest clinic in the Nkomazi Local Municipality which attracts a large number of patients to be serviced from other rural communities that has no healthcare facilities. The previous dilapidated clinic made it impossible to service patients to the required health standards hence the Department made is possible by building a new state of the art clinic in the area.

According to Ms Zandile Ratshitanga, the Acting Director: Infrastructure Implementation, the project was implemented into two (2) phases. The implementation of phase 1 covered amongst others, the construction of IBT (Innovative Building Technology) structure, septic tank, electricity and water, whilst phase 2 covered the construction of new perimeter fence, medical waste area, carports and upgrade of existing guardhouse. The project commenced in June 2018 and was completed in September 2019. Collectively, the implementation of the project was done at a cost of approximately R6.1 million. In the process, the Department created more than 22 jobs opportunities for local people and SMMEs through sub-contracting.

@Work spoke to Mr Vusi Nkosi, who has been a resident of Middelplaas for more than fifteen (15) years, he said: "We really appreciate the Department's effort of upgrading our clinic. Other community members used to get worried of being infected by other patients while queuing for healthcare service because of the overcrowded and dilapidated facility."

part of a broader strategy adopted by the Provincial Government aimed at improving the culture of learning and teaching, the Department is working around the clock to complete the newly Mbuzini constructed Childhood Development Centre (ECD). The centre is situated at Ndindini Village in Nkomazi Local Municipality. Previously, the community did not have such a facility and it was a struggle to prepare children for school. The construction of the centre hopes to provide a better foundation and developing the children holistically.

ROAD D2950 TO MANANGA TAKES SHAPE

he Department is charged with the responsibility of maintaining the road network in the Province hence the upgrading and rehabilitation of Road D2950 to Mananga which is gaining momentum. In an ongoing effort to provide transport infrastructure to citizens, the Department has embarked in the project in order to bring hope to the community members who had to travel on a gravel road to access services.

Mananga is a rural area located in the eastern part of the Nkomazi Local Municipality in the Ehlanzeni District. The area is placed between Mozambique and Swaziland. It has been challenging for community members and emergency vehicles like ambulances to gain access to the village especially during rainy seasons. The new road will now be comfortable and safer for all users and it will also bring considerable economic benefits to emerging contractors and suppliers in the area. Community members will now enjoy easy access to social amenities (schools, hospitals, shopping malls and etc) which was previously difficult. This will also enhance access to boost tourism, basic services and local economy.

The much anticipated 13 km project started in February 2019 and is expected to be completed in September 2020. At a cost of R 175 million. The scope of work includes amongst others, site establishment, construction of new pavement layers, breaking up of existing pavement layers, earthworks, sealing, patching and repairing edge

breaks, storm water drainage system, establishing of new ancillary works, maintenance of ancillary works, erosion protection, gabions, guard rails, roads signs and road markings. The project has a strong economic empowerment factor with community members and local sub-contractors appointed to do various jobs on the project. Temporary employment was provided to 35 labourers, including women, youth and persons living with disability.

R100 MILLION INVESTMENT FOR YOUTH AND WOMEN ENTERPRISES

he recent Stats SA employment figures point to a delicate situation facing many South Africans. The unemployment rate had increased to around 29%. Majority of those who continue to bear the brunt are youth and women. Government has been hard at work, devising a number of interventions aimed at mitigating the scourge.

As part of many programmes for this effort, MEC Gillion Mashego announced during the presentation of Budget vote that Honourable Premier has invested R100 Million to support youth and women owned enterprises for pavement of roads in townships and rural areas across the province.

The department of Public Works, Roads and Transport, as a custodian of public infrastructure will roll out this intervention in collaboration with municipalities and a process to identify priority areas is already underway in many areas.

Thismassive investment complements the municipal support programme which has proven successful and timely for many municipalities under financial distress. One of such successful municipal support projects is a construction of R105 Million, 10km road in Louisville which has supported over 38 SMMEs and seen 181 people finding job opportunities.

The construction of these roads is not only an important tourism boost, but also goes a long in creating much needed job and business opportunities for the local people where these projects are being implemented. These roads are; rehabilitation of a 9.96km road between New Forest and Thulamahashe, phase 2 rehabilitation of an 18km road between Bambi and Mashishing, rehabilitation of a 11km road between Acornhoek and hluvukani and rehabilitation of phase 7.7km phase 2 road between Hazy View and Sabie.

The Chief Director for Roads Infrastructure in the Department, Mr Dancy Malatjie emphasized that government is committed towards maintaining provincial roads.

"Maintenance is a necessary intervention on the road. We have long term and short term maintenance plan. In the short term, we plan to patch potholes, clean drainage systems and do grass cutting along the roads. The ideal intervention would include rehabilitation/ reconstruction of the road, but due to budget limitation that may not take place in the current financial year. But the department will continue to carry out routine

maintenance work on the road periodically to keep it safe and in traffic-able condition. Furthermore we will intensify our campaign on War on Potholes programme this financial year," he explained.

The War on Pothole programme was introduced in May 2017 in a bid to aggressively attend to pothole across the provincial road network together with all social partners which include amongst others municipalities, government agencies, private sectors and communities.

Footbridge brings relief to Boekenhouthoek community

ost people who live in deep rural areas are unable to access basic services due to lack and poor infrastructure and transport services in these areas. The Department of Public Works, Roads and Transport brought relief to the community of Boekenhouthoek by constructing an R 2.8 million footbridge in the outskirts of Thembisile Hani Local Municipality.

It took only under four months to construct the footbridge which commenced in November 2018 and was completed in March 2019, In time for use by residents, in particular school children to cross the stream during rainy season.

To incorporate aspects of Expanded Public Works Programme, emerging contractors were empowered with sub contracted work on the project, whilst local community benefited from skills development, work opportunities, with women, youth and persons with disabilities given priority. Furthermore, a total number of local sub-contractors also benefited.

"It became a challenge when there was a lot of rain because school children could not without facing the danger of being swept by the water. This posed a very risky, safety hazárd and danger to our children. Ambulances and police could not reach the communities for assistance during rainy seasons. And now, we can access shops, clinics or any other service that is across the river," said Mr Shangu, one of the villagers.

PHASE 1 OF MOLOTO CORRIDOR COMPLETE

he recent completion of phase 1 of the upgraded Moloto Road is celebrated. Sanral has elevated this project to a national priority and major engineering interventions are being introduced to improve the safety and facilitate the mobility of the more than 50 000 commuters who travel on this road every day.

The construction of phase 1 of the upgrading of R573 Moloo road, a 137km stretch from Gauteng to Mpumalanga and Limpompo is complete. It started in 2015 at a cost of R3.7bn for the whole project, over a period of six years. The budget is for Mpumalanga and Limpopo sections only. The scope of work for the first phase included the construction of four roundabouts; three in Mpumalanga —

at Vlaklaagte 1&2 and Tweefotein and one in Limpopo at the intersection of the N11 and R573 in Marble Hall.

"We further welcome the major road upgrade that are being undertaken on the N4 between Belfast and Machadodorp and also between Kaapmuiden Malelane. The upgraded road will provide better and safer mobility for rural communities who depend on transport infrastructure to access services," says MEC Gillion Mashego.
