We remain confident that together we will turn the curve in order to ensure safe, reliable and affordable transport system that is economically beneficial to everyone, especially our commuters.

To complement the above, several transport infrastructure projects are at an advanced stage in various areas to improve our road network. This will ensure that public amenities such as schools and clinics are accessible. On that note, efficient and effective execution of our mandate towards client departments in terms of building infrastructure is paramount. For this reason, we completed 102 building and transport infrastructure projects as pronouncement by the Honourable Premier during the State of the Province Address.

Lastly, we bid farewell to Mr Fikile Mbalula and Ms Patricia de Lille, wishing them well on their new responsibilities. We welcome equally seasoned leaders, Ms Sindisiwe Chikunga and Mr Sihle Zikalala, as Ministers for Transport as well as Public Works & Infrastructure respectively. Well, the journey continues. Karino Interchange, A Signet of Service Delivery

that was a jubilant expression by Premier Refilwe Mtshweni-Tsipane during the 2023 State of the Province Address (SOPA).

The former Minister of Transport, Mr Fikile Mbalula accompanied by MEC Mandla Ndlovu, HOD Charles Morolo and various dignitaries graced the occasion for the official opening of Karino Interchange on the 4th of November 2022. "Service delivery par excellence," is how the Minister described the R375 million project on the N4 in the City of Mbombela which has economically benefited local SMMEs and the workers alike. He said the purpose is to develop the main economic artery that connects South Africa with Mozambique which plays a critical role as far as tourism and freight are concerned. He also indicated that Government's strategic goal is to reduce traffic volume in terms of trucks in favour of rail.

The South African National Roads Agency Limited (SANRAL) which is the implementing agency, commenced with the project in 2019 and completed in 2022. The interchange required an 80 miter long bridge which took about 1200 cubes of concrete over two days. Furthermore, the construction included a four kilomitre dual carriage. About 276 blasting of the rock surface were conducted and more than 350 000 cubes of rocks were excavated. The amount of work, afforded business and work opportunities to over 44 local SMMEs and 843 labourers.

While the interchange has brought relief to traffic congestion, perhaps it will also soothe the pain of those who lost their loved ones along that stretch of the road. Unlike the newly built interchange, the previous intersection had become a death trap to unsuspecting drivers. Reckless motorists took advantage of the openness of the road without being considerate of other road users. As a result, many innocent lives met their fate due to either impatience or speeding of others.

MEC Mandla Ndlovu reiterated the call to all road users to obey the rules of the road while being cautious of the errors of others. "We are not opening a floodgate of carnage but this is the democratic Government's response to better the lives of its citizens. Please let us take necessary precautionary measures whenever we are on the road. We all have a responsibility to use the road in a manner that guarantees the safety of others including ourselves," pleaded MEC Ndlovu.

During her State of the Province Address, the Premier revealed that in addition to the Karino interchange, SANRAL is implementing various projects in Mpumalanga, such as the Moloto Road that interconnects Gauteng, Mpumalanga and Limpopo provinces, the R23 national road in Lekwa District Municipality and the R33 national road which crosses through Mkhondo and Msukaligwa Local Municipalities amongst others.

R5,4 billion to crank the engine of infrastructure delivery

infrastructure has a direct impact on the economy and investment potential in our communities," said Finance, Economic Development and Tourism MEC, Ms Nompumelelo Hlophe during the tabling of the 2023/24 Provincial Budget on the 7th of March 2023 in Mpumalanga Provincial Legislature. The budget is a financial aid in response to the State of the Province Address (SOPA) pronouncements by Premier Refilwe Mtshweni-Tsipane.

"Social and economic

The Department of Public Works Roads and Transport which is the custodian of public transport and infrastructure, has be allocated R5,4 billion (R5 466 783 000) to execute its mandate. According to Treasury, this will include developing and maintaining the road network infrastructure with a specific focus on tourism and coal haulage routes as well as other programmes contributing to economic growth.

MEC Hlophe also highlighted that funds that are added to the baseline include: R20 million each towards bridges in Driekoppies and Emalahleni; R70 million for Renewal Energy focusing on health, administration, and educational sites; R90 million for the Parliamentary Village, and R73 million towards Mkhondo Boarding School.

During SOPA on the 24th of February 2023, the Honourable Premier indicated that R4.294 billion was set aside during the 2022/23 financial year for strategic infrastructure development initiatives to

unlock investment and growth. "We

have completed a total number of 102 projects which include both building and transport infrastructure. These projects include 88 Educational facilities; two Social Development facilities; and one

Library," Premier explained. She also listed several roads that have since been completed. The bulk of the allocated funds will be injected on outstanding multi-year projects as well as new ones such as road P216/1 from Secunda to Embalenhle and a bridge from Emalahleni City centre leading to Pine Ridge, Clarinet, Siyanqoba and Verena.

Reckless drivers recite Christmas carols behind bars during festive season

ven before the long awaited celebration of Christmas, more than 2000 motorists throughout the country had already greeted the magistrate for various traffic offences, according to statement issued by the Road Traffic Management Corporation (RTMC). Statistics collected by the agency indicated that 2241 motorists were arrested prior to Christmas for drunken driving, speeding, driving without a licence and violation of permits, amongst others.

As the champion of public transport in Mpumalanga, MEC Mandla Ndlovu led various operations across the Province in a

law enforcement officials in Standerton during one of the joint law enforcement operations.

During the release of preliminary 2022 festive season statistics on the 17th of January 2023, Minister Mbalula said human factors account for 87% of all road fatalities. These are followed by road and environmental factors at 8%, with vehicle factors at 5%. "We have no doubt that road safety education and awareness remain critical to arrest the carnage," said the Minister. Mpumalanga improved by 23.8% in terms of road fatalities reduction from 189 to 144. Nationwide, 1 452 people died on the road during 2022 festive season, a reduction of 13.9% from 2021. The message is simple, safety starts with you.









he sun has risen, the stage is set, law and order serenades the atmosphere and Mpumalanga is in Free State to salute about one hundred sons and daughters of the soil who successfully completed their Road Traffic Law Enforcement training. The Department together with the Transport Education and Training Authority (TETA), Matjhabeng Traffic Academy and Matjhabeng Local Municipality conducted a Pass Out Parade on the 23rd of February 2023 in Welkom where various dignitaries including parents of the students graced the occasion. Matjhabeng, which literally means 'where nations meet' was a befiting place for Mpumalanga to fly the flag of the rising sun hight above the sky as the platoons of Transport Inspectorate trainees paraded the streets of the mining town which had become home to the students for the past 15 months of intensive training. The Pass Out Parade showcases both the discipline and competence of the students which they have accumulated during their training. As peace officers, they will be expected to discharge and facilitate law and order in a manner that exhibits these significant traits.

During his keynote address, the Executive Mayor of Matjhabeng Local Municipality, Cllr T.D. Khalipha, said Mpumalanga should take pride of raising a generation of disciplined youth. "I am proud to indicate that since their arrival in our town, there was never a time where we needed to attend to a case of misconduct. This is evidently reflective the hands that have groomed them. It is proof that they are from disciplined homes and indeed a disciplined Province," said the Executive Mayor who also took the opportunity to unpack the economic spin-offs generated by Matjhabeng Traffic Academy to the Municipality. "Although our local economy consists mainly of mining and agriculture, the traffic college is an investment to the municipality. We are happy that the Mpumalanga Government decided to choose Matjhabeng Traffic College while there are other colleges throughout the country. It is a decision that is not only helping to profile our college but is also assisting Matjhabeng in terms of rands and cents. Your presence here has already benefited the local economy," articulated Cllr. Mkhaliphi.

These young men and women from Bohlabela, Ehlanzeni, Gert Sibande and Nkangala districts in Mpumalanga were recruited as part of Government's long term strategy to equip young people with critical skills in order to combat unemployment. Furthermore, as a custodian of public transport, the Department is in a quest to intensify road safety by ensuring maximum law enforcement. TETA which sponsored the training programme is a strategic partner which has over the years positioned itself as a beacon of excellence in the transport sector. The Department's Acting Deputy Director-General, Mr S.B. Mona, conveyed the Department's gratitude to all stakeholders who made it possible for Mpumalanga's rising sun to shine on foreign land. "Although the MEC could not be here due

to other commitments, he has expressed his appreciation for the unwavering support from all our stakeholders particularly the Province of Free State for accommodating our sons and daughters. Today, Mpumalanga has a pool of soldiers who are ready to be deployed in various areas as duty calls," said Mr Mona.

Mr Bongani Ngwenya and Ms Ntlantla Mgidi from Pienaar and Siyabuswa respectively are amongst the students who graduated with flying colours. Mr Ngwenya who was a designated Captain of the trainees said it was a dream come true to be part of the leanership programme because he always wanted to be a Law Enforcement Officer. The training has presented Ngwenya with an opportunity to put bread on the table. "I was unemployed when I applied for this learnership and in my family I will be the only one who is employed. I was raised by a single parent which is my mom. This is an opportunity for me to assist her together with my siblings as well as my children," he explained.

Speaking to Ms Mgidi from Kammelrivier A. in Siyabuswa, Dr J.S. Moroka Local Municipality, "I have always admired the work that traffic officers do which is ensuring safe and free flow of traffic to prevent road crashes. I also wanted to be part of the team to ensure that road users including pedestrians use ours roads in a safe and orderly manner." Asked about her personal experience and expertise she accumulated over the 15 month period, Ms Mgidi said, "I have learned how to handle pressure and the demands of being a commander on the road." She further elaborated that working with people from all walks of life comes with the package. As a result, she acquired observation skills to pass good judgment of character, solve complex issues, understand the parameters of the law as well as logic reasoning to make quick decisions.

According to the Road Traffic Management Corporation (RTMC), most road accidents and fatalities are a result of human error mostly due to deliberate contravention of the law such as speeding, overloading and drunken driving. These acts necessitate a change of attitude accompanied by tight law enforcement in a form of men and women in uniform. Public transport in particular inflicts more casualties because of the number of occupants per vehicle. A case in point is the recent head-on collision between a bus and a cash-intransit van on 13 February 2023 which left 20 people dead in Limpopo Province. This was followed by another on 3 March where 21 fatalities were recorded on R573 road. Hopefully, more boots on the road to enforce compliance as regulated by the National Land Transport Act no of 5 of 2009, may help curb the carnage. Without any doubt, these young men and women have their work cut out for them.

According to DCSR's 2020/21 Annual Report, the Department is continuously supporting children, youth, women and people living with disabilities when it renders its services. The report states that library material, free Internet and Wi-Fi as well as electronic books amongst others, are appealing to all designated groups in the Province. To date, the DPWRT has 2022. While there were hurdles implemented numerous library projects throughout the Province including Umjindi, Emthonjeni, the wait was not a waste. Like fine Mashishing and Verena libraries.











Road rehabilitation anoramic view on

Department budgeted around R126 million for the upgrading of D4422 access road near Thulamahashe in Bohlabela. The construction of the 5.6 km road started in May 2022 and road started in May 2022 and is scheduled for completion in January 2024.

Initially, the gravel road was dusty and inaccessible during rainy seasons. This was very problematic since connects many villages with critical anemities such as schools, clinics shops and work places.

Amongst the scope of work that is being carried out on the project, is the construction of by-pass, replacement of existing pipe culverts, construction of concrete edge beams and kerbs, installation of block pavings for side walks and bus stops. The upgrading of the road will also see the construction of a 106 meter bridge, road markings and the installation of signage.

Currently, the project has afforded work opportunities to 48 youth, 30 women and two people living with disabilities. The projected is expected to about a total of 120 years a 120 years at 120 years and 120 years at 120 years absorb a total of 120 women, 128 youth and two people living with disabilities in the near future.

Another project that has been implemented excellently by the Department is the emergency repairs on P57/2 (R533) road between Graskop and Bushbuckridge in the Thaba Chweu Local Municipality.

The scope of work for this project consisted of rockfall mitigation works (mesh drapery of exposed rock faces) as well as general maintenance of the road sections in the form of pothole and guardrails repairs as well as installation of road signs and markings.

According to the Project Leader, Mr Ngoni Chimusoro, there were rock deposits on a section of the P57/2 road that have been posing a threat to road users. If letf unattended, this had a potential to cause serious injaries or fatalities especially at night where vision is limited.

"To avoid future damages or even loss of life due to severe rockfall events, it was therefore decided to protect several exposed rock faces along the route," highlighted Mr. Chimusoro

The project started in January 2022 and completed in February 2023 at a cost of R33.5 million. At least 20 people were employed during the implementation of the project, the number includes youth and women.

"The most effective and sustainable way to build an economy is to equip people I with the skills and know-I how to drive it. We have I therefore been working to strengthen the link between the skills that we develop and the skills the workplace needs", explained President Cyril Ramaphosa during the 2023 State of the National Address.

Responding to the President's marching orders, the Department has embarked on a recruitment drive to empower young people in Mpumalanga with entrepreneurial and technical skills in the built environment. A total of 350 qualifying young men and women stand a chance to participate in the National Youth Service programme which will offer a monthly stipend of R4300. This training will equip the young minds with artisan skills to required in building maintenance of various State facilities. This will entail performance of basic competency in respective trades such as landscaping,

painting, bricklaying, plastering, tiling, carpentry, plumbing and electrical works.

Briefing sessions will be held throughout the Province. Unemployed young people who are between 18 and 35 years of age, with a minimum qualification of Grade 12 or equivalent, residing in Mpumalanga and interest in the built environment, had an opportunity to apply. As an affirmative action employer, the Department is committed to providing equal opportunities by promoting representivity in terms of race, gender and disability when filling vacant positions. As a result, women and people with disabilities have been encouraged to apply.

Indeed, as the sun rises, Mpumalanga dawns with new possibilities. These are not the only efforts championed by the Department. In February 2023, the Department advertised 100 internship opportunities in different professions from Accounting to Engineering. These are viewed as critical to empower young graduates with the necessary experience. Equally important, these young people who are facing multiple socio-economic challenges, are able to put bread on the table. This is another way the Department is making a difference.

ne of the greatest philosophers, Socrates, described education as "the kindling of a flame, not the filling of a vessel." That is probably what Prince HR Nkosi Primary School in Msogwaba, outside the City of Mbombela, represents. The newly built, R56.3 million primary school is a priceless investment to the future leaders of the rural township which will kindle an unquenchable flame of excellence. The project which encountered several delays mostly due to Covid-19 lockdown, serves as a testimony that there is a rainbow after every storm. The long awaited dream has finally come to fruition.

The scope of work included the construction of 24 classrooms, an administration block, laboratory, library, computer centre, 30 toilets, kitchen, sports ground, parking, fencing, water and electricity. During construction, the project was able to generate much needed work opportunities. A total of 46 local labourers comprising of 10 women, 21 youth and 15 men were employed. Today, the school is standing tall, paying homage to Prince H.R. Nkosi but most importantly, paving a way for the little princes and princesses to become kings and queens of their destiny.

"We are determined to ensure that those who enter the basic education system at Grade RR proceed and complete at Grade 12. We are seeing improvement in the number of learners who start grade R and complete matric rising from 59.7 %

to 61.2%," explained Premier Refilwe Mtshweni-Tsipane during the tabling of the State of the Province Address on the 24th of February 2023 in Mpumalanga Provincial Legislature.

The Department of Public Works, Roads and Transport is charged with a mammoth task to deliver safe, reliable and affordable public infrastructure. Unlike any other Province, Mpumalanga has raised the bar as far as the provision of education infrastructure is concerned. Prince H.R. Primary School is a sample of many projects that are currently being implemented across the Province. These include amongst others, Mkhondo Boarding School in Mkhondo Local Municipality, New Ermelo Primary School in Msukaligwa Local Municipality as well as the refurbishment of Engabezweni Secondary School and Bergland Primary School in Albert Luthuli Local Municipality and City of Mbombela Local Municipality respectively. In addition to this, the Department has been at the forefront of addressing basic services such as water and sanitation in various schools throughout the Province.

"Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world," these are Madiba's words which are still echoing in

words which are still echoing in the echelons of academia. The global icon's philosophy has found expression within the Department's mission as MEC Mandla Ndlovu donated 217 bicycles to learners in Gert Sibande District as part of Shovakalula Bicycle Programme.

On the 31st of October 2022, MEC Ndlovu visited Khonzakahle Primary School at Breyten in Msukaligwa Local Municipality where he donated 20 bicycles. This is part and parcel of the Department's mandate to ensure the provision of safe, reliable and efficient scholar transport services to qualifying learners. Shavakalula specifically focuses on learners who are traveling to school between two and five kilometers. This helps to ensure that the learners are not subjected to exhaustion. Instead, they are able to arrive at school on time, with less effort and can concentrate on their studies.

Prior to the school visit, the MEC conducted an inspection of scholar transport vehicles in Chief Albert Luthuli Local Municipality early in the morning on the same day. Contrary to Shavakalula, scholar transport assists learners who are traveling above five kilimetres per trip to the nearest school.

Since safety is non-negotiable, the Department has deployed Transport Inspectors through out the Province to monitor compliance of transport operators. As the captain of vessel, MEC Ndlovu wanted to get a first hand experience of the joys and challenges encountered by learners everyday. As a result, during the trip from Carolina to Breyten, the MEC had a fruitful interaction with the learners.

BoyMathebula, one of the beneficiaries of Shovakalula, expressed his excitement that the days of walking long distance to school are over. "From now on I will be able to be at school on time and learn without feeling sleepy or tired. I am excited with my new bicycle, thank you very much MEC," said Mathebula with a bright smile.

Since learners had to return to classes and the day was just getting started, the MEC proceeded to Breyten's R36 road the Department conducted a Joint Law Enforcement. This initiative formed part of the October Transport Month campaign. The MEC vowed to intensify law enforcement which evidently paid dividends during the festive season as Mpumalanga managed to reduce road fatalities by over 23%.

Engabezweni Refurbishment stands out from the crowd

ack of public infrastructure in poor communities negatively affects the lives of local residents. The Department has been tasked with the provision of these critical socio-economic assets in the Province. One of these endeavors is the refurbishment of Engabezweni Secondary School at Emanzana, in Chief Albert Luthuli Local Municipality.

The refurbishment process started in September 2022 and is expected to end in May 2023. The eight month project has injected some economic benefits to local communities with the employment of at least eighteen (18) residents comprising of women and youth making up the majority. The scope of work includes renovation of 19 classrooms and administration block as well as the construction of Enviro-loo ablution facilities.

It is no secrete that Mpumalanga is making inroads in closing the gap

between the rich and the poor as far as access to quality basic education is concerned. The Department of Basic Education's (DBE) statistics, released in 2015, highlighted that out of the 23 589 public ordinary schools in the country, 77% did not have stocked libraries, 86% had no laboratory facilities, and 5 225 had no reliable water supply. A total of 913 schools had no electricity, and a further 2 854 had to make do with unreliable power supply.

Despite a seemingly gloomy picture, much progress has been made especially in Mpumalanga which where education is the apex priority. Since 2015 hundreds of education facilities have been constructed, renovated and upgraded. These include boarding schools, primary and secondary shools, Early Childhood Development centres (ECDs and well as the provision of basic services such as sanittion, water and sanitation.



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
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
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
