I, further, want to encourage those who need our services in our communities to go to the nearest Social Development office and our officials who are trained professionals will be waiting to assist you.


In the year of Nelson Mandela and Albertina Sisulu I wish you can feel the warmth and care of the Department of Social Development.


THE 2018/19 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

The MEC for social development delivered the department's budget vote budget speech on Friday, 25 May, 2018 at the Mpumalanga Provincial Legislature

ALLOCATED BUDGET FOR THE 2018/19 FINANCIAL YEAR

R1,551 BILLION

The 2018/2019 budget for Social Development (Vote 12) has been approved as **one billion, five hundred and fifty-one million, five hundred and eighty four thousand rand (R1,551,584,000.00)** allocated and transferred to all the five (5) programmes of the department. The following programmes in the department form part of the budget vote account



The department has made some commitments on all of its focus or key priority areas which are aimed at improving the lives of the vulnerable groups in the communities Mpumalanga Province. The department has managed to prioritise more on the critical priority areas and major achievements have been recorded as follows.

THE FOLLOWING ARE SOME OF THE KEY ACHIEVEMENT AREAS AS PER COMMITMENT FOR THE 2017/18 FINANCIAL YEAR

COMMUNITY BASED CARE AND SERVICE FOR CHILDREN

 The Department has successfully recruited a total of two hundred and sixty-two (262) Child and Youth Care Workers through the National Association for Child Care Workers (NACCW).

CHILD AND YOUTH CARE

The Department funded twenty-five (25) Child Youth Care Centres which are accommodating nine-hundred and twenty-nine (929) children in need of care and protection.

CHILD PROTECTION

Two thousand eight hundred and seventy-six (2 876) children in need of care were placed in foster care to provide a safety net and enabling environment in 2017/18 financial year.

YOUTH EMPOWERMENT

In fighting youth unemployment, the Department funded 90 Youth Development Centres where four hundred and fifty young people benefited.

ABOUT YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

The Mandate of the youth development programme of the department is to leverage investment in youth development programmes to access decent work and participate in the mainstream economy, Implement life skills programmes that offer vulnerable youth fundamental skills targeting both school going and out-of-school youth in rural areas, farms, informal settlements and those receiving grants, increase capacity of youth organizations to render youth development services and programmes to address urgent situations of youth vulnerability.

SERVICES OFFERED UNDER THE YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

NATIONAL YOUTH SERVICE CAMPAIGNS

- The programme creates a platform for youth to express their patriotism towards the development of their communities. It directs the potential of young people to become valuable and actively contributing members of society. It targets youth to serve as volunteers in a range of community contexts.
- The campaigns would be through volunteer service that would contribute in improving the accessibility and utility of any public facility.

YOUTH CAMPS

Recruit young people from a database of youth that exist in foster care, youth headed households and youth living in households that are below poverty line derived from the household profiles.

s Sibongile Mabena is one of the social workers in the department who is hands on with overseeing the Leseding Victim Support Centre, one of the victim support centres under the department based at Kwa-Mhlanga under Nkangala District. Leseding Victim support centre is a government owned facility falling under the department of social development providing care and support to victims of domestic violence. It accommodates and provide support to survivors of abuse and rape in and outside the area.

As a social worker by profession, she has dedicated her life to helping the powerless and being a voice to the voiceless through her work at the Leseding Victim support Centre.

Her good work is driven by the need to navigate through the causes of domestic violence by addressing related issues from top to bottom, help victims of violence and engaging with various branches of the department through the facilitation of admission to the centre.

She is mostly passionate about making a difference. Her milestone is measured by the number of lives she touches positively daily. "Waking up and making a difference in at least one person's life a day keeps me going" said Ms Mabena

Since she works with a lot of emotional cases raging from women and child abuse, Ms Mabena is mostly fascinated and consoled by the smiles she sees on the victims faces as they regain hope through the centre she manages.

"This keeps me on my toes an gives me strength to wake up in the morning and help even more people" she said.

ABOUT THE CENTRE

Leseding Victim support centre is a government owned facility providing care and support to victims of domestic violence. We accommodates and provide

support to survivors of abuse and rape. Services at this centre are free of charge and are available 24 hours, 7 days a week. It which is situated at KwaMhlanga Thembisile Hani Sub-district.

IDENTIFICATION OF VICTIMS AND ADMISSION



SAPS officials, social workers, a n d psychologists or through officials from courts. The clients are accompanied to the shelter or either by contacting social workers to establish if the client meets the requirements.



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ADMISSION ELIGIBILITY

• Women who are victims of crime and violence and their children, Woman accompanied by minor children and Victims who are 18 years and above

- In situations of human trafficking, hate crime and high jacking, the whole family can be accommodated at the discretion of the centre manager/board without any forms of discrimination attached
- Victims of crime are admitted on voluntary basis
- People with disabilities and Older persons
- Special accommodation for men, homosexuals and older boys (above 12 years) accompanying their parents

Admission process



Clients are brought by JCPS (Justice Crime Prevention and Security) stakeholders and

expected to bring referral letters stipulating detailed reasons for referral, Identity document or birth certificates may be requested but are not compulsory. Clients are admitted for a minimum of a day to a maximum period of six months depending on the complexity of the case.

The centre operates 24 hours 7 days a week and clients are admitted anytime. Clients are provided with basic needs throughout their stay in the shelter. The centre does not imply that families should disintegrate because of domestic violence; rather it creates a platform where in clients can receive professional intervention to the situation and assist to take informed decisions.

TYPE OF CASES LESEDING VICTIM Centre IS DEALING WITH



The centre deals with cases relating to all types of domestic violence in terms of the domestic violence Act, i.e. physical abuse, sexual abuse, emotional abuse, financial abuse which include hate crime and trafficking in person's.

PROGRAMMES RENDERED BY THE CENTRE:

While secure accommodation is provided, the main aim is to provide survivors with an opportunity to find physical

strength as well as cognitive, emotional and spiritual healing. The following therapeutic programs are therefore offered to the victims while staying in the centre

- Court preparation of victims
- Sheltering/accommodation
- One on one counseling
- Support groups for victims sheltered and those discharged
- Re unification services
- Outreach and awareness campaign to schools and community at large
- Men and boys gender prevention programmes

Counseling

- In counseling, victims are assisted to explore their feelings individually. They are also helped to identify their individual needs as well as areas of development for them and their families
- Family conferencing is also conducted as per need
- Support groups are also facilitated to afford victims an opportunity to share experiences and thus have better insight into the problem and enhance coping skills

Skills Development

 Women are empowered with economic skills and general life skills like conflict resolution, stress management, parenting and others.

Spiritual Support

Ministers of religion from the surroundings are invited to visit the

What role should a family member play?

The family members are allowed to visit the client whilst sheltered. They can also participate in counseling sessions in order to be ready to accept the client during unification. In instances when the client resides outside the province, some family members send money directly to clients for transportation. Clients are unified inside and outside the province e.g. Cape Town, KZN, and Northern Cape etc.

The safety of the victims

The centre complies with norms and minimum standards for service delivery for victim empowerment in terms of security. There is a big plastered wall made with bricks and lockable gates. The centre has allocated three security personnel one per shift to ensure safety of clients.

How can a victim contact the centre?

Due to the sensitivity of the cases handled at the centre, the address cannot be revealed. If you desperately need the services of the centre you can contact your nearest social development offices, police stations and other health facilities.

The family is a foundation of society and integral to the general well-being of individuals in relation to the psychosocial, physical, spiritual and economic needs. According to the white paper on families, it is not possible to give the concept of family a standard definition but the family can be viewed accordingly from different disciplinary definitions, family can also be viewed as a group of persons united by the ties of marriage, blood, adoption or cohabitation. It is characterized by a common residence, or if not interacting and communicating with one another in their respective social roles, maintaining a common culture and governed by family rules.

It is the well-functioning unit that provided members with caring relationships, intimacy, security, as well as mutual support that is sustaining throughout life. Our souls are wired to relate to each other and the bonds formed with families and friends represent the very essence of life. With effective parenting within the family, children are nurtured, supported and provided with opportunities for growth and development into competent, productive, loved and loving adults. It is within an effective functioning family milieu that children are socialized and taught appropriate norms and standards. Complete families embrace positive values for respect, honesty, loyalty, integrity, democracy, and peaceful existence.

Families worldwide including Mpumalanga are faced with many challenges, which impact negatively on the well-being of its members and the community at large. The challenges are related to socio-political and economic forces, such as changes in the family structure, migration, divorce, urbanization, HIV and Aids pandemic, escalating rates of sexual and other forms of abuse on women and children within families, incarceration of the bread winner, care giver and globalization.

THE DEPARTMENT'S ROLE AND SERVICES OFFERED TO FAMILIES.

The department has a unit dealing with and addressing issues related to families. The programme is the core of the services in social development. It strives to address social ills such as poverty, migration and violence amongst others through Social Workers, Community Development Practitioners and Social Auxiliary Workers in partnership with Non Profit Organisations.

Department had launched an awareness campaign of many to follow to create awareness and plead for a STOP on the killing of people with albinism at Ehlanzeni District, Pienaar, Msogwaba stadium on Saturday, 21 April 2018. The event served as a memorial for Xolani Mkhize who passed away in March. His Grave was dua up violated five days after the burial and some parts of his remains were stolen. MFC Busi Shiba was

accompanied by the Deputy Minister for Social Development Hendrietta Boaopane-Zulu and different stakeholders of the department such as South African Social Service Agency (SASSA), National Development Agency (NDA), Albinism Society of South Africa (ASSA) to name a few. A tombstone unveiling for the remembrance of Xolani was held.

The Deputy Minister had said killing of people with albinism was hurtful and needed to be stopped. She stated that "None of us has freedom until people with albinism are free from being afraid to walk freely in our country. Let the life of Xolani remind us that we must not do things to others that we do not want others to do to us, and we must use correct terminology to affirm them as human beings." said Deputy Minister Zulu.

The MEC together with the deputy minister gave people with the albinism dignity packs which they also announced that the beneficiaries will receive them every month. Mboneni Simelani a 16-year-old with albinism could not hide his excitement and said it was comforting knowing that the government is willing to do so much for people with albinism, "The cosmetics we got on the dignity packs will help us a lot because things we use are usually expensive. We also like to thank The Department of Social Development for this campaign we need more events like this so that our voices can be heard." Said Mr Simelani.


